## Northern Beaches economy at a glance

The Northern Beaches is an extraordinary part of Sydney offering world-class beach and bushland experiences, with vibrant villages that reflect our contemporary coastal lifestyle, yet few realise the rich and diverse economic opportunities on offer.

Over the past 10 years, the Northern Beaches economy has maintained a steady average growth rate of 2% per annum. The unemployment rate has been consistently lower than the Sydney average; in December 2023 it was 1.8% compared to 3.7% for Greater Sydney. The sectors that contain the highest number of local jobs are: health care and social assistance, retail trade, professional, scientific and technical services, and construction.

Manufacturing and wholesale trade are responsible for half of our exports (33% and 18% respectively). Manufacturing output valued at \$3,915 million, is the second largest contributor to our Gross Regional Product (GRP), after "Rental, Hiring and Real Estate Services".

Approximately 33,000 businesses on the Northern Beaches equates to nearly one business for every three local jobs or one business for every four resident workers. There's a high proportion of business owners among the resident workforce, and 60% of local businesses are sole traders and 30% are small businesses employing fewer than five staff.

In the recent Census, 6.1% of the workforce were working from home and were owners or managers, compared to 2.5% for Greater Sydney. The most common industry was professional, scientific and technical services (37%). The largest number of home-based businesses were in Warriewood, Mona Vale, Manly, Fairlight, Frenchs Forest and Brookvale.



### 8 Precincts

The Northern Beaches can be broken into five strategic precincts – Manly, Brookvale, Dee Why, Frenchs Forest and Mona Vale, and nine village centres – Avalon, Newport, Warriewood, Narrabeen, Freshwater, Manly Vale, Balgowlah, Forestville and Glenrose. There are also a range of smaller local centres.

Manly is the visitor gateway to the Northern Beaches, accounting for a quarter of the international tourists to NSW. It features attractive frontages to the harbour and beach, iconic Norfolk Island pines and historic buildings. This is a cohesive precinct with retail and hospitality industries close to the beach, a thriving night-time economy and knowledge intensive industries near Manly Wharf.

Brookvale has the strongest concentration of employment on the Beaches and is home to the largest industrial precinct in Greater Sydney's North District (at 86 ha). There is a wide mix of small businesses covering the construction and automotive industries, small scale manufacturing, wholesale trade and professional services. Brookvale is evolving into a place to work, create and innovate. The resurgence of the brewery scene in Brookvale, creative industries and specialist recreation functions, complement the centre's broader economic function while providing places for workers, visitors and nearby residents.

Dee Why is on track to become a thriving cosmopolitan centre by the sea. It is a population serving mixed-use centre that offers housing, retail, civic service and commercial functions. It is one of the most densely populated, multicultural communities on the Beaches.

Frenchs Forest is transitioning to a strategic centre with a Health and Education Precinct anchored by Northern Beaches Hospital. The Frenchs Forest Business Park will build upon its 9,000+ existing jobs and support clusters of health services; specialised transport, postal and warehousing activity and growing advanced manufacturing activity including pharmaceutical and med-tech companies. The NSW Government's 2041 Place Strategy aims for Frenchs Forest to be a major driver of job growth and economic activity and a hub of knowledgeintensive jobs, innovation and service delivery. It plans for more than 2,000 new jobs within the new town centre, primarily in allied health, recreation, education and accommodation sectors.

Mona Vale is the contemporary, urban heart of the north of the Beaches, offering a local, coastal village atmosphere. It provides space for community, residential, retail, commercial, industrial and education uses and is expected to service an increasingly older population. Mona Vale's industrial area caters for industrial urban services and a thriving cluster of specialist marine manufacturing, wholesale and specialist trades that support Sydney's international sailing community.

The nine smaller village centres of Avalon, Newport, Warriewood, Narrabeen, Freshwater, Manly Vale, Balgowlah, Forestville and Glenrose offer community focused spaces with close connections to their natural environment. Business and industrial parks - the larger non-centre employment precincts – include Warriewood Business Park, Cromer Industrial Park and Austlink Business Park in Belrose. These areas are focused on business-to-business economic activity, giving them a different character to other precincts. These areas are important to supply chains and enable the economic transition to high value opportunities that generate local high skilled employment including emerging advanced manufacturing and online retailing activity.



Across the Beaches there are five business chambers, providing a range of support and advice for their business communities. Chambers work to further the interests of businesses in the area or industry through advocacy, networking opportunities and various other member benefits.


#### Community Placemaking Toolkit

# Planning approvals for business: Guide to small business and the planning system

Have you checked that your business is a permissible use in the area you are planning to locate?

To assist businesses navigate the planning system, we have developed a <u>guide</u> which sets out the different pathways that apply to starting or growing a business. This guide explains three planning approval pathways that business owners are most likely to use before they open or expand their business. These pathways are:

- Exempt development (planning permission not required)
- Complying development (fast-tracked approval process by Council's building control team or an external certifier)
- Development application process (standard approval process by Council)

As you read through this guide, you might still find that you have questions, as sometimes some planning approval processes are more complicated than others. If this is the case, we always encourage prospective or existing business owners to get in touch to discuss their business circumstances.

You can do this by making an appointment at Council's website with either:

- Our Planning Enquiry Officer
- Our Business Support Service

Council have also developed a streamlined version of the standard <u>DA</u> <u>lodgement requirement form</u>, to remove those supporting documents which are not generally required for small business development applications.



#### 18 Food businesses

The Northern Beaches has a thriving food and beverage economy with a mix of high dining waterfront restaurants, cafes, small bars, pubs, clubs and pop ups across the region.

If you are looking to open a food business you will need to notify Council and appoint a food safety supervisor and meet Food Standard Code requirements set out by the NSW Food Authority.

Council also operates a 'Scores on Doors' food business hygiene rating program to promote food safety. If your business is looking to serve alcohol, you will need to apply to <u>Liquor and</u>
<u>Gaming NSW</u> for an on-premises licence.

# Outdoor dining and footpath merchandise

We aim to support a vibrant streetscape that is safe and welcoming, attracting tourists and locals to visit, enjoy and return.

The appropriate placement and regulation of outdoor dining furniture and display of footpath merchandise that ensures safe and equitable access to the footpath can be achieved whilst supporting local businesses.

In order for a premises to have outdoor dining or merchandise displays on the footpath, NSW Government legislation sets out that the following approvals are required:

- All outdoor dining on the footpath requires approval under the Roads Act 1993
- All footpath merchandise displays on the footpath requires approval under the Local Government Act 1993
- Outdoor dining on community lands such as a park or reserve, or Crown Land for which Council manages, requires approval under the Local Government Act 1993

If you are taking over from a business with an existing outdoor dining or merchandise approval, you will need to apply for a transfer of the approval. If you are not sure which approvals you need, please talk to Council at one of our Customer Service Centres, or call customer services on 1300 434 434.

Council does not allow unauthorised A-frames on public land. Council Rangers regularly patrol to ensure businesses are compliant regarding the placement of bins left in the public domain and unauthorised signage. If you're unsure about regulations or compliance rules, please get in touch with Council.
